Dear Mr. Theophilus,

I have attempted to answer the questions you asked in your letter; however, some of my answers may be vague, since I was not the Department Chair at the time.

- We never really determined that there was a concrete need--we just had numerous students that expressed an interest in the class if one were to exist. So we tried it, it made, and we grew from there.
- staffing is made up of two individuals -- one is a fulltime Music faculty member, who teaches the basic recording classes, the other is a part-time teacher that teaches the intermediate and advanced classes.
- 3. The average class size---we have approximately 25 in the advanced classes, since they are project-oriented, and the students sign up for production time on their own. The intermediate and beginning classes are usually held at 15 per class.
- 4. focus--we have two types of students--those that are degree seeking and those that are not. The degree seeking are going for their A.A. in either Sound Reinforcement or Radio (the recording classes are required in each degree). The non-degree seeking are just looking for recording time, since they are usually in bands. They usually just sign up for the advanced class over and over for the studio time.
- Number of hours---approximately 3 hours a week are required of each student.
- 6. I've sent you the curriculum...as far as I know, we have no resources other than ourselves.

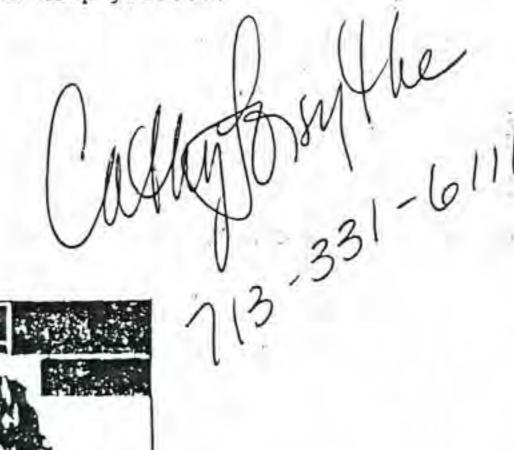

THE COURSE IS 30 HOURS IN LENGTH MEETING 3 HOURS PER SES-SION. (10 CLASSES)

In regard to preparing a music industry program: the 4 year programs usually combine music hours, business hours, and some sort of wprk-experience interne experience. Some courses that are not usually offerred, but which I would consider essential for anyone planning to get into the industry include a basic songwriting course, a history of rock course, and a "roots of American music," that would include country music, gospel music, blues, etc. If there are ensemble playing requirements, a small combo of any kind, e.g. bluegrass, orck, etc. ought to be as reasonable as playing in the college stage band.

These are just a few quick ideas. I am sure you are looking into the existing programs to check their course offerrings. I would imagine you would also want to make some sort of agreement with one of the local studios to provide engineering training. This would enable you to fulfill any need for students in that area, while staying away from the massive expense of actually building a studio.

I enjoyed my stay in Austin, and was impressed by the enthusiasm and dedication of the local people. I would be happy to talk to you further about your program. Our 800 phone number is 800-423-2017.

Dear Mr. Nelson,

Austin Community College is exploring the possibility of establishing an Associate Degree in Commercial Music in the Fall of 1988. I am currently a member of ACC's Business Management Advisory Committee.

Almost a year ago I approached Dr.Dan Angel, President of ACC with a proposal to initiate this degree. He supported the concept and has provided me with several resource persons at ACC. They include; Tom Husak in the Music Department, and others in the Humanities Division, Technology Department and the Business Management group.

It seems to me that such a program would have a positive impact on the professionalism of the Austin music community. Approximately 200 programs have been started around the country, although most of them are not offering as comprehensive a program as the one proposed for ACC. There are presently 16 in Texas. One of the most notable is South Plains Junior College at Levelland. It was established in coorperation with Tom T. Hall.

Currently I am obtaining information and curriculum from the more well established programs throughout the US. Also, I have been working with various local music businesses who have been most supportive.

One concept that I feel would be an asset in establishing the program is to utilize existing studios for classes and student interns. ACC could purchase "down time" at a reduced rate from the studios and take advantage of the expertise that already exists in Austin. Studios would gain from the interns services and the time purchased by ACC. ACC would gain by not having to build a studio now and by the expertise of the studio engineers.

Others I have discussed this with include Ray Hennig at Heart of Texas Music, Ernie Gammage at the Chamber of Commerce (who has provided a great deal of support), Wink Tyler, Terry Likona and Malcolm Harper. Everyone including seven Austin studios have expressed support and offered assistance.

I grew up in the Alpine area and started assisting musicians in producing demo tapes in 1964. While I could take music courses, there were no production classes and we all learned as we went. Now there is MIDI and many technological advances that require the same determination and motivation to learn, but few opportunities to develop ones skills.

It is the development of those skills and providing the opportunity to musicians and persons who want to enhance their production techniques that the ACC program would serve. I truly believe the program would, in time, increase the effectiveness of the music industry in Austin.

The program, as I would like to see it, would include; stagecrafts, lighting, audio/video production, promotion, management and all the new technology. Persons could obtain an Associate Degree in Music Performance, Music Production, or Commercial Music.

The job resources for graduates locally has concerned us. However, Alvin Community College provided information that they have been offering their degree for five years and have yet to graduate anyone with a two year degree primarily because they ARE placing their folks in jobs. If ACC is able to establish a truly excellent degree program with community support we should be able to attract and place students nationwide.

Recently, my wife and I attended the ASCAP workshop at the Austin City Limit's Studio at KLRU. Their goal seemed to be to attract Austin area musicians to Nashville. They alluded that Austin would never get their act together to be a viable "professional music business center". For the first time, in our experience, the meeting was attended by Austin area bankers, attorneys and accountants. A comment was made by one of the bankers from Texas Commerce that Nashville should "HIDE AND WATCH"... (Austin). This indicates the business community is taking the music industry more seriously locally.

This brings me to my letter to you. We have a great deal of commitment from ACC to see this program fly. People that I have mentioned have felt it would lend support to Austin as a music center. You have done more than anyone to establish Austin and Texas as the home of significant music in the eyes of the music community worldwide. Your encouragement and awareness of this endeavor would assist us and lend credibility to the ACC program.

Any thoughts you have for the program's focus, content and direction would be greatly appreciated. Given your experience and expertise, I would value any suggestions you are willing to offer or persons you feel we should contact regarding this proposal.
